#### Graduate Student Scholars Highlight: Anahita Verahrami



Project: the application of acoustic monitoring to understand the impacts of illegal gun hunting on populations of forest elephants in the northern Republic of the Congo

In this month's newsletter, we're highlighting scholarship recipient Anahita Verahrami. Ana is a Masters student in the Graduate Degree Program in Ecology. Her research with Dr. Sara Bombaci focuses on using sound recordings from the rainforest to understand the impacts that illegal gun hunting is having on a population of forest elephants in the northern Republic of Congo. She hopes to use her specific skillset to train members of local communities in Central Africa so they can use these methods to monitor wildlife in the areas surrounding their homes and increase the access these communities have to their rightful lands.

#### Pangolins and Building Conservation Capacity in Takamanda National Park, Cameroon

On Friday, March 31 at 2:30pm in Johnson Hall 108, the Africa Center will be hosting Jerry Kirensky Mbi. Jerry is the Conservator (Park Warden) of Cameroon's iconic Takamanda National Park in the South West Region. # These start-ups are helping women while reforesting Africa

The winners include: the Shea Empowerment Foundation, an NGO that aims to plant 2000 Shea trees in south west Nigeria, to help create long-term economic as well as environmental security for local communities; Baobab des Saveurs, a start-up operating in Senegal which trains local women to plant economically valuable trees like the

# Meet 10 Storytellers Supported by Africa Refocused

Africa Refocused is a space founded by National Geographic's Nature, Environment, and Wildlife Filmmakers (NEWF) group. Their goal is for African storytellers to own and drive the narrative about the need to protect the continent's natural habitats and wildlife. Since NEWF's founding in 2017, they have built a community of talented storytellers from across Africa, referred to as NEWF Fellows. To date, there are 137 Fellows from 26 countries—from Morocco to South Africa, from Nigeria to Tanzania, and beyond—who are paving

Baobab; and the Herou Alliance, a Malibased women's cooperative which exports Moringa products to eight countries and supports over 5,000 local women producers.

# Largest Kenyan solar plant but little benefit to locals


