

Project: Evaluating smoking cessation interventions for people with HIV in South Africa


In this month's newsletter, we're highlighting scholarship recipient Chukwudi Keke. Chukwudi is a second year PhD student in Environmental and Radiological Health Sciences, with a specialization in Epidemiology. His research with Dr. Jessica Elf focuses on exploring some of the perceived barriers to smoking cessation among HIV infected smokers in South Africa. He hopes to facilitate focus group discussions and in-depth interviews with behavioral and peer counselors to access perceptions about behavioural counselling, peer support, combination nicotine replacement therapy and medications for HIV-infected smokers.

On Wednesday, February 22 at 4pm in Lory Student Center Room 304, join the Africa Center in welcoming Dr. Truman Young. Dr. Young is a Professor Emeritis and Restoration Ecologist with UC Davis and Affiliate Professor with CSU. His lecture, titled "Economic justifications for conservation: a useful tool but a foolish foundation?" will explore the reality that conservation and development are inherently in conflict, but that there are points of contact between the two that provide hope for greater compatibility.

Into Africa: Presented by the Village Care Project

On Thursday, March 9 from 6 to 7:30pm, Into Africa will be presented at the Global Village Museum of Arts and Cultures. This event will be presented by Georgia Evans, President and Founder of the Village Care Project. VCP is a nonprofit based in Loveland that helps indigenous African villagers, especially those in Tanzania. Goals of the organization include: education and assistance regarding clean, safe drinking water; distribution of treated mosquito bed nets to help prevent malaria; delivery of tarp to waterproof thatch and mud homes; and distribution of solar LED lanterns. Admission to the program is \$5 per person, and light refreshments will be served. Advance reservations are recommended.

On January 31, 2023, it was announced that Dr. Melinda Laituri, professor of Geography at CSU, was given the rank of Fellow by the Council of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS). She was honored in the section of Geology and Geography for distinguished contributions to geography and geospatial sciences, particularly for advancing interdisciplinary, participatory initiatives that use geospatial science to tackle complex, societally important problems. "In the past there have been few women geographers in this category so this was for me quite an honor," said Dr. Laituri of the award.
