Ambassador Pamela White: *Democracy In Crisis*

Ambassador Pamela White has had a long career in public service. She was a Peace Corps volunteer, held senior positions at USAID, and served as Ambassador to The Gambia and Haiti. Join us in welcoming her to CSU tomorrow, October 25 at 3pm in the LSC's Longs Peak Room.

Hosted by the Office of International Programs, White will be speaking about the failures of democracy around the world and the urgent need to address the issue of electing autocratic leaders who undermine democratic institutions.

African wild ass that exists on the Messir Plateau in the Danakil Desert of Eritrea. As the world's most endangered equid, African wild ass are subject to habitat loss, competition with livestock, and hunting. By exploring population growth rates using an age-structuring matrix model, Tesfai found that the greatest threat to population viability seems to come from livestock impacts on the resources that limit the African wild ass population size under anticipated climate change scenarios. Attend this guest lecture to learn more about how the presence of domestic herbivores, particularly cattle, may threaten the survival of wild equids in the arid ecosystem.

Combatting the illegal cheetah trade, researchers first need to find the source

Led by Executive Committee member
Paul Evangelista, researchers at Colorado
State University are breaking the flow of
the illegal trade of live cheetah cubs by
searching for undocumented wild
cheetahs that are supplying the high
demand for pets in the Middle East. In
the Horn of Africa, cheetahs are not so
much poached for skins and parts, but
rather caught as cubs and trafficked with
other contraband through Somaliland

Civil societies are key to Africa's climate change resilience, says Dr. Adesina

President of the African Development
Bank Group, Dr. Akinwumi Adesina says
civil society organizations are essential
partners in the Bank's effort to build the
continent's resilience to climate
change. Addressing the 2022 Civil Society
Forum on October 6, Adesina highlighted
the African Development Fund's Climate
Action Window to mobilize up to \$13
billion to provide farmers and pastoralists
with climate-smart agricultural

and Yemen to wealthy collectors across the Arab Peninsula. With a new \$1 million dollar grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife, Evangelista's team will conduct surveys across selected regions of six African countries; Ethiopia, Eritrea, Djibouti, Somaliland, Somalia, Kenya and South Sudan.

In this episode recorded from a live event, Mvemba is joined by His Excellency Hassan Sheikh Mohamud, President of the Federal Republic of Somalia. The newly elected President came into office for the second time in May 2022 promising a more inclusive government and greater stability. They discuss the challenges his government faces, including countering Al-Shabaab, food scarcity during one of the worst droughts in decades, and a rising cost of living.
