12th Africa MAAFA Conference

Sankofa African Heritage Awareness, Inc., a 501 c 3 education nonprofit presents the 12th Africa MAAFA Education Conference: America's Apathy to African American Post Traumatic Enslavement and Jim Crow Disorders.

The conference will emphasize how 160 plus years after Reconstruction, including the Civil Rights Era of the sixties, have not been sufficient to completely extirpate the malignant and traumatic slave disorders in African American life due to the many persistent reminders. Medical, historical, and governmental records support the fact that some of these mental aberrations and physical impairments are determinants traceable to America's enslavement and Jim Crow Eras.

The conference will be held at Laramie County Community College, Union Pacific Rooms, 1400 East College Drive, Cheyenne, WY 82007 on Saturday, **October 14**, from 8:30am-11:50am. The event is free, including refreshments.

Dibul Kouana: A Visual Language for Feminine Prestige & Arts of the Cameroon Grasslands



Africa-focused exhibitions on display at the Gregory Allicar Museum of Art.

The Dibul Kouana exhibition explores the visual complexity of beaded aprons known as *dibul kouana*, or *pikuran*, which are worn by women and used to promote social status, personal identity, and social ties.

The Arts of the Cameroon Grasslands is a peripheral installation accompanying Dibul Kouana. In this peripheral installation, handcrafted

objects from Cameroon provide an example not just of the country's social and environmental diversity, but of artistic variation as well.

Not only are local communities and organizations essential for conservation but also for addressing issues of sustainability, poverty reduction, and economic development in Africa. However, local organizations collaborate with international organizations to assist these communities in protecting the biodiversity they inhabit, conserving fauna, adapting to climate change, and enhancing their social and economic well-being.


